September 13, 2020 Genesis 2:4b-7, 15-17; 3:1-8

Use this resource at home to guide your household's daily devotions.



Pray: Light a candle. Open your devotion with prayer.

Merciful God, you created people not as subjects to rule, but as partners in tending and enjoying this bountiful earth. Help us release our shame and guilt over what we have done wrong, accepting instead your mercy and forgiveness offered through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.



Read: Read the key verse from Sunday's reading.

So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate; and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate. (Genesis 3:6)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

From the beginning of creation, God's primary focus was the nurture of humanity. Once fallen, God continued to love and care for people, healing their shame and forgiving their sin.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

How do you experience shame? Are sin and shame connected? How does isolation deepen shame? How can community (or at least one trusted person) heal shame?

What does it mean to be a caretaker of this earth? How are we doing?

For the littles: What is your favorite animal? Plant? Toy? God created all these! God made people wise to help care for them.



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May the Creator create something marvelous in you. Amen.

Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Identify three things that cause you shame. Choose one to work on this week. Spend time looking at the situation from every angle. What was your part? What makes the event shameful? What can you do differently next time? Share your experience with someone you trust. Then ask God to remove the shame.

Pray: Light a candle. Open your devotion with prayer.

Almighty God, you long for us to trust that you hold our lives safely in your hands. Reveal the surprises you have for us in your good time, and show us that your mercy never fails us, in Jesus' name. Amen.



Read: Read the key verse from Sunday's reading.

He brought him outside and said, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them." Then he said to him, "So shall your descendants be." (Genesis 15:5)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

Abram doubted that God would fulfill God's promise of descendants. But God reaffirmed God's promise, stating Abram's descendants would be as numerous as the stars. Often God's promises are grand, and they are fulfilled in surprising ways.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

Tell of a time you were surprised. Was it a good surprise? Why or why not?

What of God's promises for your life do you hold most dear?

For the littles: Can you count the stars? God's love for you is greater than the stars!



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God bless you more abundantly than the stars in the sky. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Go outside on a clear night and look at the stars. Find an app that helps you identify the constellations. Do some research to discover what people have believed about the stars over the centuries. What does a sky full of stars mean to you?

Pray: Light a candle. Open your devotion with prayer.

Compassionate God, you have the power to turn our most foolish acts into something of benefit. Use our lives for your highest good, in spite of our own intentions, for the sake of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.



Read: Read the key verses from Sunday's reading.

But Joseph said to them, "Do not be afraid! Am I in the place of God? Even though you intended to do harm to me, God intended it for good, in order to preserve a numerous people, as he is doing today." (Genesis 50:19-20)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

Joseph finally came face to face with the brothers that had done him wrong many decades ago. Here he would face a great challenge—would he avenge himself or would he offer forgiveness and seek reconciliation?



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

Who deserves your "I told you so!" Why? Will you offer an "I told you so" or an "I forgive you"?

What would you have done in Joseph's place? What was the outcome of Joseph's forgiveness for his brothers?

For the littles: Have you ever said, "I told you so!" Have you ever said, "I forgive you!" Which felt better? Why?



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God meet your "I told you so" with "I forgive you." Amen.

Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Go to a local farmer's market. Buy more food than you need. Give it to individuals or families in your neighborhood who might have trouble accessing healthy foods.

Read: Read the key verse from Sunday's reading.

Moses said to the people, "Remember this day on which you came out of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, because the Lord brought you out from there by strength of hand; no leavened bread shall be eaten." (Exodus 13:3)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

When God decided to free the Hebrews from slavery in Egypt, God did not do so quietly. God rained fire and death upon Egypt, passionately claiming God's people as God's own.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

Is God stoic or passionate? Why do you think so?

Why are you worth God's fierce love? (You are, you know!)

For the littles: Do you think God is quiet and calm or wild and loud? Why do you think so? Could God be both?



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God's fierce love for you burn in your soul. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Attend an open meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous. Listen to the stories of people who were in bondage to addiction. Pay attention to how they became freed from the daily horrors of addiction. How are they still struggling to stay sober? Share something about yourself in the meeting to let them know you are there to learn.

Golden Calf

October 11, 2020 Exodus 32:1-14

Use this resource at home to guide your household's daily devotions.



Pray: Light a candle. Open your devotion with prayer.

Merciful God, you do not punish us as our deeds deserve, but rather show compassion to your wayward people. May we in turn show grace to others, that love may abound, and all may know your mercy, through Jesus our savior. Amen.



Read: Read the key verses from Sunday's reading.

The Lord said to Moses, "Go down at once! Your people, whom you brought up out of the land of Egypt, have acted perversely; ...they have cast for themselves an image of a calf, and have worshiped it and sacrificed to it, and said, 'These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt!"" (Exodus 32:7-8)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

The Hebrew people were alone and frightened in a new land. Their leader had disappeared up a mountain and hadn't been seen since. Their instinct was to return to the gods they knew the gods of Egypt. When God's wrath burned hot for them, Moses reminded God that God needed to learn the ways of the people before the people could learn the ways of God.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

What do you trust more than God? (It's ok if you do—it's a human thing.) How might you shift your perspective to place more of your trust in God?

What expensive item do you wish you had? How would it make you happier? Could you learn to be happiest without it?

For the littles: What's your favorite possession? God loves you even more than you love that!



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God be enough. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Sell something you own that is valuable. Use some of that money to pay your bills. Give some away. Notice that how you distribute that money can say a lot about your values and priorities.

Tell of a time you experienced or initiated a broken promise. How did it affect the relationship? Was the relationship ultimately mended? If so, how, and how long did it take?

Who are exploited or overlooked in your community? What could you do to make their lives better?

For the littles: What's awesome about babies? You were a baby once!

May God bless the important people in your life. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Do some research on infertility—not the medical aspect, but the social/emotional toil it takes on a family. Learn how to be supportive. Learn what to say and what not to say to encourage those struggling with infertility.

Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

Elijah was a great prophet working to get God's fickle people to return to God. But he couldn't do it alone. God sent him to a poor widow whose gift of hospitality made all the difference.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

God instructed Elijah to help a widow from a foreign country. Instead, the widow helped him. What can we learn from people who come from different countries? Tell of a time help came to you from an unexpected place.

What have you been refraining from doing because it's hard to trust God? What can you do to demonstrate trust in God this week?

For the littles: What is your favorite flavor of cake? A widow made cake for Elijah, and God made sure the widow never ran out of ingredients!

May God provide for you from unexpected places. Amen.

Plant some bulbs that will grow in the spring. Over the winter, pray for the healing of our planet. In the spring, as your bulbs sprout and blossom, celebrate the planet's resilience.

God went on to give a second chance to Nineveh, too. Everyone God encountered here was filled with the abundance of God's mercy.

Tell of a time you were so wrapped up in your own drama that you were unable to see God's grace in the world.

What does it mean that God desires to save all people in all nations? How can you be an agent of God's work throughout the world?

For the littles: How would you keep yourself busy if you were stuck in the belly of a sea monster for 3 days?

Isaiah had a vivid and supernatural vision of God, where Seraphs hovered around the throne of God singing God's praises. In a simple act of touching Isaiah's lips with a hot coal, God purified him for the work of a prophet.

How do you get in your own way? What might God be able to accomplish in you if you were not operating out of fear or apathy?

Are there prophets among us today? What prophetic message do you think God sends today?

For the littles: What do you think angels look like?

What are your top 5 values? What do these say about what is written on your heart?

Whose voice do you refuse to hear? Why? Would there be a benefit to listening? What might you learn?

When jealous advisors tricked the king into outlawing worship of God, Daniel remained loyal to God. After surviving the sentence of execution by lion, Daniel's courage turned an entire kingdom toward God.

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

Tell of a time you felt like you were being thrown to the lions. What did you do to cultivate resilience?

How have you made a difference in your world? Who benefited from your actions?

For the littles: If you could, would you rather have for a pet a lion, a hippo, or a monkey? Why?

May God make big things out of your small actions. Amen.

Download a mindfulness app to your smartphone. Every time the mindfulness bell goes off, stop what you are doing and pray. Remember how Daniel's small act of prayer changed an entire nation.
